Events in History

100 years ago


The Fleet Air Arm was formed on 1 April 1924, as a specialised branch of the Royal Air Force, covering RAF squadrons operated from aircraft carriers and the fleet, battleships and cruisers. This coincided with the commissioning of HMS Hermes, the worlds first tailored aircraft carrier.

On May 24, 1939, the Fleet Air Arm was placed entirely under Admiralty control, becoming independent or the Royal Air Force. It officially became the Air Branch of the Royal Navy, responsible for naval aviation operations, by September that year it comprised of 20 squadrons with 232 frontline aircraft and 191 trainers. Of course the war unleashed British air industry and in 1945 the Fleet Air Arm comprised no less than an astounding 59 aircraft carriers, 3700 aircraft and a staff of 72000 officers and men plus 56 Naval air stations.

From those early formative years to current operations in Afghanistan and Iraq, Naval personnel and aircraft have played a leading role.

The ability to rise above the sea, stay airborne, and carry crew and weapons has shaped history and continues to be a vital part of modern warfare.

The Fleet Air Arm's story is one of sacrifice, comradeship, invention, and achievement. Its pilots' ultimate flying skill – landing on carriers – has been a defining aspect of British aviation.



60 Years Ago

On 28th May 1964, the Fleet Air Arm Museum in Yeovilton first opened its doors to the general public. The museum was formally inaugurated by HRH the Duke of Edinburgh on the occasion of the 50th anniversary of the formation of the Royal Naval Air Service.

The Fleet Air Arm Museum is a must-see attraction with its wide range of helicopters and fixed wing aircraft exhibits, some of which date back over 100 years.

To celebrate the museum turning 60-years-old visitors can delve into the archives and find out more about the museum and its incredible history with a new digital exhibition – The Fleet Air Arm Museum at 60.

10 Years ago

On 22 July 2014 HMS Illustrious returned home to Portsmouth for the last time. Waiting to greet her were hundreds of maritime enthusiasts. After 30+ years 'Lusty's' White Ensign was lowered for the last time at a decommissioning ceremony at its Portsmouth's Naval Base. It was also a symbolic occasion in the history of the Royal Navy – this was the last time the Ensign was to be lowered on the Invincible Class Aircraft Carrier. HMS Illustrious was launched by Princess Margaret in December 1978. Lusty was replaced by HMS Ocean, following its £65 million refit.



Recent events

Fleet Air Arm Association AGM and Reunion Dinner

On Saturday morning the AGM was held.

At the AGM meeting there were some amendments to the constitution made and a roundup of what the officers had done in the previous year. Peter Murray was awarded the position of Vice President of the association in recognition of the service he has done for the association over many years. Peter said he "was both surprised and honoured to become Vice President, and couldn't wait to tell his wife!"

On Saturday evening more members came along , including the association President Rear Admiral Tom Cunningham and its Patron Vice Admiral Sir Adrian Johns for the Gala Dinner and disco. A raffle was also held and a 'roll a pound for the bottle of rum'. Attendees were very positive about the event and thanks was given to Alan Key and Dave Smith for organising it.



Fleet Air Arm Memorial Service

Telegraphist Air Gunners (TAGs) served in Fleet Air Arm aircraft from 1922 – 1950, providing communications by Morse Code and manning the rear gun.

Three thousand TAGs were trained in the 28 year life span of the branch. 507 were lost through enemy action and/or flying accidents, 69 became Prisoners of War. Most TAGs served only for the period of WW2, returning to civilian occupations in 1945/46. TAG's were awarded 2 CGMs, 115 DSMs, 20 BEMs and 134 Mentions in Dispatches.

They served in 77 different Aircraft Carriers. Each year the Association presents the TAGA Trophy and Medal to the outstanding Air Engineering Mechanic of the Year chosen by the Air Engineering staff at HMS Sultan.

The Telegraphist Air Gunners Association has held a Memorial Service on the third Sunday in May since 1953 when the Duchess of Kent unveiled the Fleet Air Arm Memorial at Lee on Solent.

Since 2013 when the TAG's Association dissolved, the service has been organised by the Fleet Air Arm Association.

This year the event fell on Sunday19th May.

It began with a lunch at the Lee on Solent Golf Club. There was a welcome by Chairman of the FAAA, and introductions by Vice President Peter Murray. Grace was lead by Valerie Sayer, and the toasts were given by FAAA secretary Jim Moulson and FAAA Patron Sir Adrian Johns. There was also a short speech by Lt Hayley McDermott RN.



This was followed by the Memorial Service at St Faiths Church which was conducted by The Reverend Doctor Paul Chamberlain, vicar of St Faith's, and The Reverend Timothy Ndegwa, chaplain RN currently based at HMS Sultan, after which an informal wreath laying ceremony at the memorial itself.



It was lovely to have representatives from HMS Sultan join in with the memorial and wreath laying.



It would be great to have more association members come along to this annual event, so why not put it in your diary for next year, when it will be held on Sunday May 18th. I will print a reminder in the Autumn edition of the newsletter.


Airshows
